A. Chalk Art with Mom and Dad (June 28)

B. Poster-making Contest (June 28)

1. This is a group contest for Lower School students. Each group can have 3-5 members. Each level should have at least one group representative.

3. The theme of the said contest is "**Proud to be in Stonyhurst**".
4. All posters must be in ½ illustration board. The school will provide the illustration board; the contestants will bring their own coloring materials.
5. All artworks will be done on the spot and must be completed within the allotted time of two hours, (10:00 AM- 12:00 NN)
6. The best poster will be chosen as winner and each member of the winning group will receive a medal.

STUDENT COUNCIL POSTS, OPEN FOR CANDIDATES

As the school year opens, the students will need new sets of leaders to govern them until the school year ends. Thus, posts are now open to candidates for Student Council (SC) Officers.

The students can file for candidacy for the SC election from June 27 to 30. A candidate may be a part of a political party or may run independently. Campaign period starts on July 1 and ends on July 7. The casting of ballots is on July 8.

To complete the line up of officers for the **Lower School**, it must consist of a President from Level 6, Vice President from Level 5, Secretary from Level 4, Assistant Secretary from Level 3, Treasurer from Level 6, Assistant Treasurer from Level 3, Public Relations Officer from Level 4 and Auditor from Level 5.

For **Upper School**, the line up of the officers will be President from US4, Vice President from US3, Secretary from US2, Assistant Secretary from US1, Treasurer from US4, Assistant Treasurer from US1, Public Relations Officer from US2 and Auditor from US3. Each year level will have one representative.

This year, we will also introduce Junior Officers for Levels 1-2. For ECED, the line up of the officers will be President from Level 2, Vice President from Level 1, Secretary from Level 2, Assistant Secretary from Level 1, Treasurer from Level 2 and Assistant Treasurer from Level 1.

ELECTION GUIDELINES

1. Interested students must file a certificate of candidacy. Secure a form from the Student Council

Moderators, fill out the form and submit the same.

2. Campaign paraphernalia may be printed on materials of your choice, the largest of which is the size of the cartolina. (As much as possible, we do not encourage tarpaulins, use biodegradable materials instead.)

3. All materials for posting must be approved/signed by the Department Coordinators.

4. The bulletin boards, white board for lost and found, the hall area and the canteen may accommodate your campaign materials, provided that you will use masking tape for posting. You may also ask for the permission of advisers before posting materials inside the classroom.



PARENTING CORNER

Raising Successful Children

Raising children takes patience, skill, and involvement. They do not need another chum; they need guidance, structure, and, yes, sometimes discipline.

1. Ask about their homework – what it is, when it's due – and check to make sure they do it.
2. Provide a quiet place, with a good light and away from distractions, for them to do homework.
3. Make sure they get a good sleep each night and eat a healthy, substantial breakfast each morning.
4. Talk to them about school for at least a few minutes each day to let them know you're interested in their studies and that you think school is important.
5. Teach them respect for others and responsibility for their own behavior.
6. Make sure they get regular health and dental check-ups.
7. Limit children's exposure to television and video games.
8. Be positive about school. If parents say "I wasn't good at school" or "I really didn't like school," this can turn children away from learning.
9. Check your children's school websites regularly to keep yourself informed.
